Language While Making Turns to Control Critical Second

Target Target Area Path Of Travel

Central Vision usage

Fringe Vision usage On Target condition Off Target condition

Transition Peg: Driver, Co-Driver

Left turn Right turn Skid Recovery

Go Condition
Slow Condition

Cover Brake Smooth Stop

Side Position - left turn Side Position - right turn

Left side limitation Right side limitation

Forward Position from a stop

Right turn Left turn

Large radius right turn Oblique left or right turn Exiting Lane Position

Forward Position while moving

Right turn Left turn

Large radius right turn Oblique left or right turn Exiting Lane Position

Rear Zone Control

Open, Closed, Unstable Charger, One Pacer, Habitual Judge distance in seconds Search Left, Front, Right Zones

For Hole For Gap

90 degree while stopped 45 degree while moving Selection of Hole or Gap

Turn head before turning tires Evaluate POT to Target Area Selective Attention Matrix

A. B. C Windows

Control your Buffer

Moving turns

- hold brake to Tpeg

Turns from Stop position

- accelerate at Tpeg
